As most of you are aware we paused the January 2025 Regular Meeting so that the new Executive could meet and have a strategic planning meeting. For this year our priorities are as follows.

1. Message du Président

Au nom du Comité exécutif de la Division, j'aimerais souhaiter à tous les membres de la Division d'Ottawa une année 2025 remplie de bonheur et de santé.

Comme la plupart d'entre vous le savent, nous avons annulé la réunion régulière du mois de janvier 2025 afin de permettre au nouveau comité exécutif de se réunir et de tenir une réunion de planification stratégique. Nos priorités pour cette année sont les suivantes.

Communications : La Division d'Ottawa, conformément à la politique de communication de l'Association, veille à « accroître la visibilité de l'Association grâce à un réseau de communication informatif, pertinent et opportun qui répond aux besoins de nos membres tout en soutenant la raison d'être, la mission, la vision et les valeurs de l'Association. »

En 2024, avec près de trois ans d'existence, on a constaté qu'il a été temps de remettre à jour le site web de l'AVDO. Une vérification du contenu a été effectuée et un autre fournisseur de services a été identifié afin de mener à bien cette importante initiative. Malheureusement, à l'automne 2024, une erreur critique s'est produite affectant l'ancien site web, erreur que l'on n'a pas été en mesure de corriger. Par conséquent, des solutions de rechange ont été identifiées afin d'aller de l'avant.

La Division d'Ottawa s'engage à mettre en ligne, le plus rapidement possible, un nouveau site Web à la disposition de ses membres afin de répondre à nos besoins de communication actuels et futurs.



Commemorative Pathway Plaque Program ~ RCMP National Memorial Cemetery at Beechwood

To honour the proud traditions of the Force and help in maintaining the legacy of our service to Canada's communities, a group of RCMP Veterans - Ottawa Division have since 2019 been working closely with the Beechwood Cemetery Foundation on a commemorative plaque program. It is a small but significant initiative that studies the history of the Mounted Police, records many of its important people, groups, events and key accomplishments and then memorializes them on informative plaques that are placed along the pathways in this cemetery. In addition to bilingual inscriptions and images, each commemorative plaque is equipped with a near field communication (NFC) device. The NFC allows visitors and students who have smart phones and tablets the opportunity to link directly to a website that provides additional explanation and detail on the subject background.


At the close of the annual May 23rd Vigil & RCMP 151st Anniversary Parade and Memorial Services, a number of new commemorative plaques were dedicated for 2024.

Throughout the 150-year history of the Mounted Police, Canada has truly benefited from the dedication, service and exemplary leadership of a number of its Commissioners. A special area near the Main Monument in the RCMP National Memorial Cemetery at Beechwood has recently been set aside to recognize and celebrate some of these leaders. Commissioner Maurice J. Nadon was selected as the first Commissioner to be honoured at this site.



Commissioner Maurice Jean Nadon (1974/1977)

Maurice Nadon, from Mattawa, Ontario, was the 16th Commissioner of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. He brought a wealth of police and investigative experience from cross Canada to his appointment.



Notably, Commissioner Nadon steered the Force through challenges of public scrutiny, fostering modernization and significant change. He played a pivotal role in directing operations during the 1976 XXIst Olympiad in Montréal and advocated for intensified efforts against organized crime. Under his leadership, the RCMP's Canadian Police College and Canadian Police Information Centre underwent crucial modernization to support law enforcement nationwide.


Commissioner Nadon's impact extended to the establishment of the RCMP's first national Native Policing Branch, the institution of the First Nations Special Constable Program and the roll-out nationally of Cross-Cultural training and Police-Community Relations units. His transformative initiatives included the development of the RCMP Member Staff Relations Program, francophone cadet training, paid overtime, and the integration of women into the RCMP.

In recognition of his contributions, a patrol vessel and the RCMP's National Headquarters, named the "Nadon" and "MJ Nadon Government of Canada Building" respectively, honour his legacy. Throughout his 37-year career, Commissioner Nadon was an exemplary and visionary leader.

The RCMP Band

From the outset of the long and colourful history of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, music and bands contributed to the Force's culture, traditions, and overall success. As playing a musical instrument was a very popular pastime in the late 1800's, many members of the North-West Mounted Police were also capable musicians.

The first Mounted Police band was formed at Swan River, Manitoba, where it gave its première performance on May 24, 1876. In the fall of that year, the group also played during ceremonies for the signing of Treaty No. 6 at Forts Carleton and Pitt, and in 1877, performed the same role at Blackfoot Crossing for the signing of Treaty No. 7. The success of the Swan River band on those

occasions quickly led to similar groups being formed at many NWMP forts on the Prairies, and at Dawson City in the Yukon.

In 1938, efforts by Commissioner S.T. Wood to rekindle the early traditions and character of the Mounted Police led to the formation of the RCMP Band. Over the years, members of the Band regularly took part in ceremonies, celebrations, and events of national historic importance, welcomed royalty and heads of state and represented Canada and the RCMP abroad.

Before ceasing operations in 1994, the Band traveled extensively across Canada and abroad promoting closer ties between the Force and the communities it served. Accomplished, entertaining, and impressive in concert, the RCMP Band was revered by enthusiastic audiences of all ages and walks of life. It was a highly respected, well recognized, and beloved Canadian institution that performed in more locations, throughout our great country, than any other musical aggregation in history.

Dedicated in 2024, the RCMP Band commemorative pathway plaque highlights some of the history of the Band since its early days until its function was retired in 1994. Special care was taken to ensure that the Lyre patch from the Band members' uniform, the actual music notation of Charles O'Neil's Regimental March (based on the original "Regimental Bugle Call" of the Mounted Police), and former RCMP artist Paul Cedarburg's pin design created especially for the RCMP Showband, all found their way to this plaque. Women in Uniform – The first 50 years

The last commemoration of the day celebrates the special anniversary for women Regular Members in the RCMP. While women had historically held positions in the Force, some of which were very critical to police operations, it wasn't until 50 years ago that they were sworn in as police officers, held a badge and wore the uniform of the RCMP.

On May 23rd in 1974, on the 101st anniversary of the Force, Commissioner Maurice Nadon announced that the RCMP would begin recruiting women candidates for uniformed regular member police officer positions. Thirty-two females from across Canada were simultaneously sworn in on September 16, 1974, as Troop 17, becoming the first women to join the Force as regular members, and were sent to Depot Division in Regina to commence their training. Upon successfully graduating in March 1975, they were assigned to serve in detachments throughout Canada. While few modifications were made to training standards when women entered the Force, uniforms and kit initially designed for women proved to be cumbersome and impractical for police duties.

In 1990, the RCMP decided that women members would wear the same ceremonial and service uniforms and kit as the men. These earlier women members—and for the many who followed—faced, at times in their careers, difficult challenges from some of their male counterparts, managers and often even the public they served.

Throughout this formative period, women regular members proudly lined up with their male counterparts, faced the same dangers and challenges and performed the full range of both general and specialized policing duties. Those who paid with their lives in the line of duty are forever remembered on the RCMP Honour Roll.

In December 2006, Beverley MacDonald, today, Senator Bev Busson, an original member of Troop 17 was appointed as the 21st RCMP Commissioner and the first woman to lead the entire Force. Today women regular members make up more than twenty percent of the uniformed police service and earn their way through the ranks from Constable to Detachment/Unit/District Commander to Division Commanding Officer and Commissioner.

Women in uniform are well regarded and respected by the public and their peers and continue to make significant contributions as RCMP officers in every part of Canada and around the world. This special plaque will remain installed permanently at the central pathway at the Fallen member Cenotaph.



Programme de plaques commémoratives du sentier—Cimetière commémoratif national de la GRC à Beechwood

Afin d'honorer les fières traditions de la GRC et aider à maintenir l'héritage de notre service aux communautés du Canada, un groupe de vétérans de la GRC - Division d'Ottawa travaille depuis 2019 en étroite collaboration avec la Fondation du cimetière Beechwood sur un programme de plaques commémoratives. Il s'agit d'une initiative modeste mais significative qui étudie l'histoire de la Police montée, enregistre bon nombre de ses personnages, groupes, événements et réalisations clés, puis les commémore sur des plaques informatives placées le long des sentiers de ce cimetière. En plus des inscriptions et des images bilingues, chaque plaque commémorative est équipée d'un appareil de communication en champ proche (CCP). Ce dispositif permet aux visiteurs et aux étudiants disposant de téléphones intelligents et de tablettes de créer un lien direct vers un site Web fournissant des explications et des détails supplémentaires sur le sujet.

À la clôture de la veillée annuelle du 23 mai et du défilé et des services commémoratifs du 151e anniversaire de la GRC, un certain nombre de nouvelles plaques commémoratives ont été inaugurées pour 2024.

Tout au long des 150 ans d'histoire de la Police montée, le Canada a véritablement bénéficié du dévouement, du service et du leadership exemplaire de plusieurs de ses commissaires. Une zone spéciale près du monument principal de ce cimetière a récemment été réservée pour reconnaître et célébrer certains de ces dirigeants. Ce jour-là, nous avons dévoilé notre première plaque honorant le commissaire Maurice John Nadon.



Commissaire Maurice Jean Nadon (1974/1977)
Originaire de Mattawa, en Ontario, Maurice J. Nadon a été le 16^e commissaire de la Gendarmerie royale du Canada. Il a apporté à cette fonction une vaste expérience du travail policier et des enquêtes acquise aux quatre coins du pays.



Au cours de son mandat, il a guidé la GRC alors qu'elle a traversé une période difficile sous la loupe du public et l'a amenée à se moderniser. Il a joué un rôle de premier plan dans la direction des opérations lors des XXI^{es} Jeux olympiques à Montréal en 1976 et a préconisé une lutte accrue contre le crime organisé. Sous son leadership, le Collège canadien de police et le Centre d'information de la police canadienne de la GRC se sont considérablement modernisés pour mieux appuyer les services de police partout au pays.


Il a contribué à la mise en œuvre du premier service national de police autochtone de la GRC, du Programme des gendarmes spéciaux autochtones et de groupes de formation interculturelle et de relations entre la police et les communautés à l'échelle nationale. Parmi les initiatives de transformation qu'il a pilotées, citons la création du Programme des représentants des relations fonctionnelles de la GRC, la formation des cadets francophones, la rémunération des heures supplémentaires et l'intégration de femmes à la GRC.

En reconnaissance de ses contributions, un navire de patrouille et l'immeuble de la Direction générale de la GRC ont été baptisés respectivement le *Nadon* et l'immeuble M. J. Nadon du gouvernement du Canada. Tout au long de ses 37 années de carrière, il a été un leader exemplaire et un visionnaire.

The RCMP Band

Dès le début de la longue histoire colorée de la Gendarmerie royale du Canada, la musique et les orchestres ont contribué à la culture, aux traditions et au succès global de la Gendarmerie. Comme jouer d'un instrument de musique était un passe-temps très populaire à la fin des années 1800, de nombreux membres de la Police à cheval du Nord-Ouest (P.C.N.-O.) étaient également des musiciens compétents. Le premier orchestre de la P.C.N.-O. a été formé à Swan River, au Manitoba, où il a donné sa première représentation le 24 mai 1876. À l'automne de la même année, le groupe a également joué lors des cérémonies de signature du Traité n° 6 aux forts Carleton et Pitt et, en 1877, il a assumé le même rôle à Blackfoot Crossing pour la signature

du Traité n° 7. Le succès de l'Orchestre de Swan River à ces occasions a conduit rapidement à la formation de groupes semblables dans de nombreux forts de la P.C.N.-O. dans les Prairies et à Dawson City au Yukon.

En 1938, les efforts du commissaire S.T. Wood, pour raviver les anciennes traditions et le caractère de la Gendarmerie ont conduit à la formation de l'Orchestre de la GRC. Au fil des ans, ses musiciens ont participé régulièrement à des cérémonies, des célébrations et des événements d'importance historique, accueilli la royauté et les chefs d'État et représenté le Canada et la GRC à l'étranger. Jusqu'à la fin de ses activités en 1994, cet orchestre a énormément voyagé dans tout le pays, ainsi qu'à l'étranger, afin de resserrer les liens entre la Gendarmerie et les collectivités bénéficiaires de ses services. Aussi divertissant qu'impressionnant sur scène grâce à ses musiciens accomplis, il a su conquérir des publics enthousiastes de tous les âges et de tous les horizons. Ce fut une institution canadienne appréciée, hautement respectée et de

Femmes en uniforme – les 50 premières années

La dernière commémoration de la journée célèbre l'anniversaire spécial des femmes membres régulières de la GRC. Bien que les femmes aient historiquement occupé des postes au sein de la Gendarmerie, dont certains étaient très essentiels aux opérations policières, ce n'est qu'il y a 50 ans qu'elles ont prêté serment comme policières, détenaient un insigne et portaient l'uniforme de la GRC.

Le 23 mai 1974, à l'occasion du 101^e anniversaire de la GRC, le commissaire M. J. Nadon a annoncé que

la GRC recruterait désormais des femmes pour remplir des fonctions policières en uniforme. Le 16 septembre 1974, 32 femmes provenant des quatre coins du pays ont été assermentées simultanément, devenant ainsi les premières femmes à entrer dans la GRC à titre de membres régulières. Elles se sont ensuite rendues à la Division Dépot, à Regina, pour suivre leur formation dans la troupe 17. Après avoir obtenu leur diplôme en mars 1975, elles ont été affectées dans des détachements à divers endroits au Canada. Quelques modifications avaient été apportées aux normes de formation à l'arrivée de femmes à la GRC, mais les uniformes et le matériel conçus pour elles étaient encombrants et peu pratiques pour effectuer des tâches policières.

En 1990, la GRC a décidé que les femmes porteraient les mêmes uniformes de service et de cérémonie que les hommes. Ces premières policières et celles qui ont suivi ont parfois eu à composer avec des collègues masculins, des gestionnaires et des membres du public qui leur [ont rendu la vie difficile](#).

Pendant cette période initiale, ces femmes ont fièrement travaillé aux côtés de leurs homologues masculins, affronté les mêmes dangers et défis et accompli l'éventail complet de tâches policières générales et spécialisées. Malheureusement, certaines ont péri dans l'exercice de leurs fonctions et sont inscrites au Tableau d'honneur de la GRC.

En décembre 2006, Beverley Busson (MacDonald), membre de la troupe 17 (1974-1975), a été nommée 21^e commissaire de la GRC et a été la première femme à diriger l'organisation. De nos jours, les membres régulières représentent plus de vingt pour cent de l'effectif policier en uniforme et gravissent les échelons, du poste de gendarme à celui de chef de détachement, de service ou de district, de commandante divisionnaire et de commissaire. Elles sont très estimées et respectées par le public et leurs pairs et continuent d'apporter une contribution importante en tant que policières dans toutes les régions du Canada et dans le monde entier.

Cette plaque spéciale restera installée en permanence sur ce chemin central.

Christmas Cheer Follow-Up

RCMP Veterans Association, Ottawa Division, just completed two holiday initiatives that they have been organizing each Christmas for more than 10 years.

Members of the Association put together 55 Christmas hampers which have been distributed to the spouses of Ottawa area RCMP veterans who passed away in the past year and to current veterans who are shut-ins or are currently in hospital or for other reasons are unable to get around.

A second initiative is baking and providing Christmas cookies for distribution to homeless or street involved youth who are served by Operation Come Home, a not-for-profit organization which assists youth experiencing homelessness to achieve their goals, and avoid the experience of homelessness as an adult. They offer Employment, Education, Housing, Mental Health, Harm Reduction, and Drop-In programs for at-risk youth aged 16-29.

This year's cookie drive resulted in over 3,000 home baked cookies being donated. Volunteer Veterans packed cookie boxes donated by a local Metro Grocery store which were brought to OCH to be distributed to 128 youth. In addition, several trays of pastries, and tins of quality commercial cookies were made available to the youth and staff at OCH to eat while at the drop-in centre in downtown Ottawa.

MEDAL PRESENTATION

On December 3, 2024, members of the Division Executive Committee met for the monthly meeting. During the luncheon recess, presentations were made to members of ODVA.

The presentations were for the King Charles III's Coronation Medal, commemorating the Coronation of His Majesty King Charles III as King of Canada.

Eligibility and criteria are as follows: Candidates must have made a significant contribution to Canada or to a particular province, territory, region or community of Canada, or have made an outstanding achievement abroad that brings credit to Canada.

The medal program was first announced three days before the Coronation, on May 3, 2023, by the Prime Minister.

The medal was designed by Cathy Bursey-Sabourin, Fraser Herald at the Canadian Heraldic Authority at the Chancellery of Honours, Rideau Hall.

Description:

A circular medal, silver in colour:

On the obverse, a crowned and robed effigy of His Majesty The King of Canada, facing right, circumscribed with the inscriptions "CHARLES III DEI GRATIA REX" and "CANADA".

On the reverse, there appears on the background a ring of frosted triangular shapes evoking the image of a string of pennants displayed for a celebration. These 13 shapes allude to Canada's provinces and territories, and their circular arrangement conveys the idea of inclusion for all Canadians. The circle is also an important concept for many Indigenous Peoples, symbolizing not only equity but also the cycles of the natural world. Over this background appears the Canadian Royal Cypher in the center, the date of the Coronation, 6.V.2023, on the left and the words "VIVAT REX" meaning Long Live The King, on the right.

Presentation of the medal was made by Glen Siegersma, Chief Administrative Officer, RCMP Veterans' Association, accompanied by Inspector Eric Sheppard, representing the RCMP.

On February 20th, 2025, Her Excellency the Right Honourable Mary Simon, Governor General of Canada, presented the King Charles III Coronation Medal to 52 individuals during a ceremony at Rideau Hall. Recipients attended from across Canada (Victoria, BC to Goose Bay, NL), and were among 100 recipients she personally nominated as part of the wider Coronation Medal program. Included was RCMP veteran and retired Staff Sergeant Garth Hampson (Reg #19201), who was awarded the medal within the category of "Extraordinary Service to the Crown" during his career and in retirement. 

3. Over the course of the months that I have worked on assembling *The Spirit*, every once in awhile I am asked how one might obtain documents from a member's service or personnel file. I elicited some assistance of an expert from the Access to Information and Privacy Branch at NHQ Ottawa.



ACCESS TO YOUR OWN SERVICE, PERSONNEL OR MEDICAL FILE:

The member, RM or CM, can contact the Career Development and Resourcing Office or Health Services Office in the Division where retirement occurred. For those living in Ottawa and the National Capital Region, there is **no direct contact phone number**. To set up an appointment in a controlled environment to view the file, **Retired members'** records are held by HQ Archives, email

Archives_HQ@rcmp-grc.gc.ca. The individual may take notes, and if he or she seeks copies of materials, all efforts will be made by the custodian of the records, to provide copies at the time of access. If satisfying the request for copies is not immediately possible, the requesting individual will be advised when copies will be made available. Every effort will be made to keep the time lapse between request and provision to a minimum. The Office in question will vet the file for materials that are not releasable (for example psychological testing instruments) to ensure that they are not copied and released. Individuals may only access their own service, personnel or health files. There are no circumstances that allow an individual access to the service, personnel or health files of another member or employee. **Active members'** files should be with Leikin Records : NHQIS LEIKIN RECORDS / SIDG BUREAU DE DOS-SIERS LEIKIN (RCMP/GRC), email RCMP.NHQISLEIKINRECORDS-SIDGDOSSIERSLEIKIN.GRC@rcmp-grc.gc.ca.

ATIP—Continued

FOR ACCESS TO A SERVICE, PERSONNEL or MEDICAL FILE OF A DECEASED MEMBER:

Sometimes, a family member will seek documents from a Service File concerning the relative's service in the Force, usually a parent or sibling. A request can be made by submitting a formal application to the RCMP Access to Information and Privacy Branch. This can be done either electronically or sent in a paper request form ([English](#)), ([French](#)). Information about a deceased member's service, such as information on transfers and length of posting can be released, but any request for access to performance or medical documents for a member who has been deceased for less than 20 years, is very limited, and little, if any, information can be released. The authority for this limitation is found in the Privacy Act, R.S.C., 1985, c. P-21, subsection 3(m) which states that personal information remains personal for 20 years following death.

From my experience reviewing Service Files on behalf of the Quarterly, in the preparation of the Obituaries, the Service file does not, as a rule, contain photographs of the member, particularly post 60's Service Files. If you are looking for photographs, they will more than likely be found in the Personnel File. Documents of historical interest include documents attesting to Commendations or Awards and the member's Engagement Documents. In recent years, members have been provided, on retirement, their original Engagement Documents, together with their Certificate of Service, but I still encounter some originals during review.

CONCLUSION

Hoping for some semblance of clarity, attached to this edition is RCMP Form 6331E and 6331F, complete with relevant information for the best possible results. These forms are found on the RCMP website at <https://rcmp.ca/en/corporate-information/forms>. If anyone has trouble tracking down any of these forms, or completing the information required, please feel free to contact me at ottawa.thespirit@rcmpvpa.org and I will send or deliver what you need and help with completing the forms. The Instructions on the form, both English and French make mention of a \$5.00 fee, but I have been told that there will be no fees assessed.

4. As we are facing some challenging days and months ahead, I thought I might include a fairly detailed poster about **Petroleum Products: From Crude Oil to Useful Products, the Petroleum Value Chain**. The poster is a few years old, but it serves to suggest that life without oil is not so simple.





LAST POST JANUARY 25, 2025

Johnny Lyall, S/255, Special Constable (Retired)
October 1, 1940 - January 20, 2025

Years of Service: 1964 - 1984

Postings: "G" Division

Special Constable Johnny Lyall, Reg. No. S/255, died January 20, 2025, in the hospital surrounded by family in Yellowknife, NWT. He was 85 years old.

S/Cst. Lyall joined the Force June 1, 1964, and he served in Cambridge Bay and Frobisher Bay/Iqaluit, NWT/Nunavut.

"They told me I was going to be a guide and an interpreter. When I started, we still had dog teams and then we had skidoos" (personal communication, Monday July 24, 2017).

On July 3, 1984, after 20 years of service he retired to pension.

THE LYALLS OF THE NORTH by Cpl K.G. Huxter

During centennial year, emphasis is being placed on past accomplishments. In the Force's efforts over the years, it has been assisted by many people outside – people from all walks of life in all parts of Canada. The North is no exception.

There is one person living in the eastern part of the Arctic whose help probably extends over a longer period than any other individual. Ernest Wilson Lyall left Newfoundland-Labrador and moved to the Northwest Territories in 1926. At that time the Force was just becoming established in the eastern Arctic.

Since then, Ernie has lived and worked in the majority of communities east of Cambridge Bay. He started at Port Burwell and except for two short stints at Port Harrison and Povungnituk, spent the rest of the time in places such as Lake Harbour, Pangnirtung, Cape Dorset, Pond Inlet, Arctic Bay, Cambridge Bay, several small places that have since closed like Fort Ross, and last but not least Spence Bay.

He moved to Spence Bay and helped establish the settlement in 1949. He still lives there. Ask if he intends to stay and he replies, "I've been here too long to leave now!" He appears as fit as a fiddle, so if this is any indication, he will be around a long time yet.

During these years in the North, Ernie has helped judges, lawyers, accused persons, and members of the Force, especially due to the fact that he speaks Eskimo fluently. In the earlier years it was difficult to find anyone with a complete command of both English and Eskimo. In this aspect, Ernie has probably assisted more members of the RCMP than any other person in this part of the North today.



THE LYALLS OF THE NORTH - CONTINUED

Over the years he has seen many men come and go and occasionally we get into conversations about some of them. Some of his comments clearly point out that he has, in fact, been around for a long time.

On one such occasion, I mentioned that the first time I met Supt W.G. Fraser, Retired, he was the Commanding Officer "G" Division, and I was a raw recruit fresh out of training, and on my way to the eastern Arctic. I met him in Ottawa on my way through.

Ernie said, "The first time I met W.G. Fraser, he was a raw recruit himself and on his way to the eastern Arctic. This was in Fort Burwell in 1932. With was the son of the Commissioner, at that time Sir James MacBrien."

Ernie knew the Late Supt H.A. Larsen, another former CO of "G" Division. At the time he was Captain of the *St. Roch*, which was on its way through the Northwest Passage. He visited the crew of several occasions via dog team from Fort Ross, when the *St. Roch* was wintering in Pasley Bay during the winters of 1940-41 and 1941-42.

A member of the crew, Cst. A.J. "Frenchy" Chartrand (1), died suddenly of a heart attack February 13, 1942.

Ernie remembers helping to build the cairn that marks Chartrand's lonely grave on a hillside near Pasley Bay. It is perhaps a bit coincidental that Ernie's son and I will be there this centennial year to assist building a cairn in memory of Superintendent Larsen and the *St. Roch*.

Ernie has provided valuable assistance on several famous murder trials. One, the Kookeyout murder case, involved a young Eskimo woman who shot her unwanted husband who had been chosen by her parents – the custom in those days - so she could have the man of her choice. This was reported to Larsen in June 1942, but travelling was impossible at that time of year between Pasley Bay and where the murder occurred at Thom Bay on the easter shore of Boothia Peninsula.

He reported it to Pond Inlet Detachment and the following April a member of that detachment arrived at Fort Ross, and Ernie guided him to Thom Bay and assisted in the complete investigation from then until it ended – a couple of years later. They located the body near Thom Bay, dug it up, and took it back to Fort Ross where they reburied it to wait for the arrival of the supply ship for the autopsy.

When the supply ship got close, they dug it up again and prepared it for the autopsy. However, the supply ship was unable to get into Fort Ross that year because of ice. The body was buried again to await the ship the following year. When it returned, the body was dug up again and a doctor on board performed the autopsy.

Ernie and a detachment man from Pond Inlet made another trip to Thom Bay to secure the witnesses. The trial was held on the ship at Fort Ross and Ernie acted as interpreter. It is also interesting to note that Ernie acted as guardian of the body during the time it was kept at Fort Ross, as the detachment men had to return to their post at Pond Inlet.

In 1929, Ernie received his first offer of a job with the Force. As a marine engineer for \$60 a month, he would be sent out for one year's training and when completed and posted he would hold the rank of Lance Corporal. The letter was signed by the late Commissioner Starnes. He was only making \$20 a month with the Hudson's Bay Company at the time but was eager to go further north and did not want to go south

When the Force opened a detachment in Spence Bay in 1950, it needed a Special Constable. Ernie was approached because of his knowledge of the Eskimo language and the country. He did not take the job but continued to assist detachment men when ever his help was needed.

On June 4, 1964, the first of Ernie's sons to join the Force, John, (2) was signed on as a Special Constable and posted to Cambridge Bay Detachment. Another of Ernie's sons, Patrick, worked for the Force as a guard in Inuvik. He applied to join as a regular member but was turned down because of his height.

On March 2, 1970, Ernie was sworn as a Justice of the Peace and a Coroner for the Northwest Territories. He has served the needs of the area in that capacity since then.

One of the highlights of Ernie's life came last June. He was proud to be able to sign on his last son, John Charles "Charlie" (3) as a Special Constable investigator for Spence Bay Detachment.

This is the only known occasion when anyone in the Division has signed on both sons as Special Constables while acting in the capacity as Justice of the Peace. It is a first for the Division where a man has two sons as Special Constable in the Force.

ENDNOTES:

1. 10155 Cst. A.J. CHARTRAND served from January 22, 1926, until his death of an apparent heart attack February 13th, 1942, while on duty near the Boothia Peninsula, Northwest Territories. He was a crewmember on the St. Roch while it was on the historic voyage throughout the Northwest Passage. He was buried at Pasley Bay, Northwest Territories.
2. S/255 LYALL, Johnny, served in the RCMP from June 1, 1964, to July 3, 1984.

 - C. Post Death Family Assistance Document.
 - D. Civilian Survivor & Executor Information Package.
 - E. Information regarding reimbursement programs for: Regimental markers, plots and/or niches.
 - F. Referral of next of kin to the Editor of the LAST POST, who will work with the next of kin to create a final tribute to be published in the Association's LAST POST and posted on The Vets Net website www.rcmpvets.ca.
3. There is an offer of tribute for a funeral/celebration of life and/or an interment/inurnment. This may include, Red Coats Honour Guard, piper and/or bugler (some restrictions apply), accoutrements such as palls, flags, boots, Stetson, etc.




