
nouvelle génération de retraité(e)s qui générera un maximum d'intérêt afin de les inciter à devenir membre.




As we mark this Remembrance Day of 2017 across Canada, we remember the service and sacrifice of our members - long since past, and serving still - who have put their lives on the line, to serve and protect, to fight and defend, in every major conflict that Canada has participated in, over the past 144 years.

Three members of the RCMP have been awarded the Victoria Cross for gallantry during the South African War and World War I. Veterans fought and died in Vimy and Passchendaele, served gallantly with the Canadian Provost Corps in World War 2, and were amongst the Canadians working valiantly to secure peace in Afghanistan this century.

We will remember them.


Henry Larsen School

Book explores formative years of the Force

Jack Dunn of Calgary has recently completed a major study of the formative years of the RCMP in what he calls the 'most momentous 12-year period in Canadian Prairie history'.



Entitled "*The North-West Mounted Police: 1873-85*", the book examines many aspects of police life during the March West, the whiskey trade, Indian Treaties, the arrival of Sitting Bull, the destruction of the buffalo, the construction of the railway and the North-West Rebellion.

Mr. Dunn did his research using diaries, letters, newspapers, official reports and almost 1,000

personal files. The book has more than 100 illustrations, some of which have not been previously published.

Memorial Flame/La Flamme Commémorative



On Sept. 23 a ceremony to commemorate RCMP employees, Veterans and their families, was held to light a torch at the Centennial Flame on Parliament Hill, to then light the new RCMP Veterans' Memorial Flame at the RCMP National Memorial Cemetery at Beechwood, the national cemetery of Canada.

The three-part ceremony began with the torch lighting. This was followed by a relay march around Parliament Hill and a torch relay run to Beechwood, where the procession ended at the RCMP Veterans' Memorial Flame. The flame was then lit from the torch. Col (Rtd) Scott Becker represented his father, retired C/Supt. Bill Becker, who had the original vision for the cemetery. Bill Becker died Nov. 11.

Acting Commissioner Dan Dubeau attended the Special RGM in October to represent the Governor General, and to present Brian Hunter with the Sovereign's Medal for Volunteers on her behalf. The Medal recognizes volunteer achievement in a wide range of fields. Recipients are nominated within their community.

Since 1976, Brian has been the lead co-ordinator of the annual preparation of Camp Massawippi, a bilingual sleep-away camp for youth with physical impairments located in Quebec's Eastern Townships.

Created in 1951, the camp offers special programs for campers between six and 30 years old who have motor, hearing, or visual impairment.

For more than 40 years Brian has organized an annual Spring "Work Party" where he recruits friends and volunteers from across Quebec and Ontario to come and spend a weekend to do a much needed clean-up. They do renovations and construction projects ensuring the camp is safe, well adapted and ready to receive its guests.

Without Brian's effort, the campers would not have the facilities it does to enjoy the summer months. Not only was Brian the driving force behind his work crew, he was also the cook and prepared the meals for all of the volunteers.

Veteran of the Year

Suzanne Sarault was awarded the 2017 Veteran of the Year Award at the Special RGM in October. Suzanne is a tireless volunteer, both on behalf of the Ottawa Division RCMP Veterans' Association and for other causes and agencies.

For the Ottawa Division Suzanne was the editor of *The Spirit* from 2013 to 2015 and Director of Communications from 2014 to 2015. In these positions Suzanne brought forward a modern and active communications platform, enhanced the content and design of *The Spirit*; integrated the French language in all ODVA communications; developed a strong communications team; developed standard operating procedures for all aspects of "communications"; and, created the ODVA Dropbox account to archive all ODVA photos and documents. Suzanne also enhanced the relationship with the ODVA Ladies' Association.

"Suzanne," nominator Joan Panich wrote, "lives the values of the RCMP Veterans' Association. She is an inspiration to us all."

Suzanne is a popular emcee for major events. Specifically for the RCMP Veterans, she has hosted the Musical Ride Performance for Veterans and the Commissioner's inspection of the Musical Ride for three years and was the emcee at the Gala Evening at AGM 2015 in Québec City—where she was also the Director of Communications.

She was the Event Co-ordinator of the Fifth Anniversary of the RCMP National Memorial Cemetery in 2009, and emceed at various events over the years with the Pipes and Drums and the Canadian Association of Veterans in United Nations Peacekeeping.

Suzanne was the emcee at the Dedication of the Cenotaph at the RCMP National Memorial Cemetery, handled communications for the 10th Anniversary of the RCMP National Memorial Cemetery, and co-ordinated Division social events.

For the last two years Suzanne has overseen communications for the RCMP Veterans/Denniston Bone Marrow Golf Classic, and for the 2017 Torch Run (Lighting of the Memorial Flame) Beechwood Cemetery.



In other volunteer efforts since 2009 Suzanne has been emcee for events for Veterans Affairs Canada and the Canadian Armed Forces, and since 2005, the annual Candlelight Tribute of the City of Ottawa. For veterans organizations Suzanne has been emcee and done event planning for the Korean Armistice Day, Korea War Veterans' Association of Canada and the Embassy of Korea.

A proud Francophone Canadian Suzanne volunteers regularly with Heritage Canada including emceeing at Canada Day VIP section since 2009, including at the 2017 Canada Day 150 celebrations, and at

Winterlude as VIP and Information Officer. For the City of Ottawa Suzanne was the emcee for Ottawa4FortMac, in 2016.

Suzanne is a dedicated golfer and regularly volunteers for golfing events including for the Professional Golfers Association (PGA) of Canada as starter and main announcer at the National Capital Open to Support our Troops MacKenzie Tour.

She has been the on-stage moderator at the Annual Symposium of the Association of Professional Executives of the Public Service of Canada since 2009, was a radio news reader for Accessible Media Inc. in 2012/13 and, for the Lions Club of Gloucester, was the emcee and announcer for the Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides in 2014.



This is my last edition of the *Spirit*. When I took over the position of Editor two years ago I had just retired and was settling into a new home on Lake Ontario. As with most of us when we retire, I was worried about keeping busy, what I would do every day when I woke up, and if I would drive my husband—who works from home—crazy.

Little did I know that one of life's great myths is that you have more time when you retire. You don't have more time, but you do have the opportunity to fill your time with things you love to do.

One of the things I have loved to do is to put together the *Spirit* four times a year. To keep in touch with old friends and to make some new ones. To learn some new skills and to build on some I already had from my earlier career in newspapers.

We have enough money to feel safe and secure and we have the benefits we need to help us deal with some of the tougher issues. I sit quietly when I listen to some of the other retirees I meet, those who do not have good benefits, who do not have a pension, or an association which both advocates for them and provides them with friendships and support.

I am proud that so many retired RCMP employees recognize how fortunate they are and continue to give back to their communities as retirees, as they did when they were working.

I used to work for an Assistant Commissioner who started every team meeting with the question, 'what did you do to keep Canadians safe today?' The first meeting he surprised us with the question, but by the next meeting we all had answers ready. I don't have that responsibility anymore, but now I ask myself, 'what did you do to make someone's life better today?' I hope I always have a good answer.

As I write this we have not found a new editor for

the *Spirit*. I hope we find one soon. Someone who sees this position as an opportunity to stay connected to your RCMP life as you live the next phase of your life. An opportunity to take on new challenges, to meet new people and to connect people through a vital communication link.

If you think you might like to give it a try please contact me. I have information all set up for the transition, and I'll help you through the first few issues until you make the publication your own.

I have included a photograph of my 'office staff'. This is Cedar and Temagami and they spend much of their day curled up under my desk. See how easy the job is—all you need for help is two sleeping golden retrievers.

In closing I do want to thank Suzanne Sarault for being such a patient mentor, colleague and, now, friend. To Ralph Mahar and Gary Walkling, thank you for your support. To Dave Jeggo, thanks for having my back. Most importantly my thanks to everyone who has contributed to the magazine, including the volunteer translators and my 'second reader', Don Day. A few people make most of the submissions to the *Spirit* and I could not have done it without their outstanding and amazing support. Last, but certainly not least, my thanks to my husband Tim Lougheed. As a freelance writer and editor he is his own 'help desk' and I depend on his technical help.






