This is my second message to you, and a lot has taken place over the winter months in the Division, so I wanted to let you know what your Executive has been working on. You may recall that I mentioned we would focus on four priorities over the next two years, the AABCs. Allow me to provide you with some updates.

First, we have made very good progress with the Advocacy and Support initiative. Under the leadership of our Chief Advocate, Vet. Joe MacLoughlin, training will take place for several Association volunteers on May 16th in Moncton. Newly trained volunteers will provide Advocacy and Support services to our membership throughout the province in the following areas: Veterans Affairs Canada (VAC) submissions, bereavement benefits and questions when a veteran passes away, Canada Life concerns, etc. Funding has been made available to help facilitate this training.

Secondly, we would like to add to the Affinity partners that our Association already has in place so that our membership can enjoy some savings throughout the province. Discounts at hotels, restaurants, golf courses, etc. You can access existing <u>Discounts for Association Membership</u> on our Association website.

Thirdly, we are in good shape budget-wise this year, better than the previous two years, and this is thanks in large part to a renewed partnership with the New Brunswick RCMP at "J" Division for the gravesite inspection program. We currently have over 500 sites that are visited each year by our team of inspectors. With the financial support of our agreement with "J" Division and with the generosity of our gravesite inspectors, most of the money generated stays within our division to assist us with other programs, such as the Advocacy and Support noted above.

Fourth and finally, our biggest communications avenue has been our Connexion newsletter. After many years of fantastic service, our former Editor Brenda Bouck requested a rest. We thank her for creating such an informative and interesting Connexion. Building on this success, I am pleased to report that we have a new Editor, Ms. Jennifer LeJeune. As you can see in this edition, we are striving to be more targeted in our communications. In addition to our newsletter, we hope to improve our communications via social media, and we will continue to send important emails as necessary.

So, as you can see, we have been busy during the winter months. Our efforts are for you, our Veterans, and our Association members.

Finally, I wish to say that our division is blessed to have numerous volunteers who work to help each other and maintain contact and camaraderie during our working days. Volunteers such as our area Directors and other volunteers who look after things such as our communications, bursaries, and gravesites, to name but a few. This training is the first step in equipping Advocacy Committee members with the tools they need to provide accurate, timely, and effective support to veterans and their families across the Division.

Trained Advocacy Committee Volunteers will be able to

- Assist surviving spouses and families in managing notifications related to pensions and insurance after the loss of a loved one, offering support to help them adjust and move forward.
- Help veterans apply for VAC pensions or health-related assistance and follow up on inquiries.
- Collaborate with other Veterans Support and Advocacy teams across the country to share information on unique cases.
- Occasionally assist with applications for support from the RCMP Veterans Foundation or Benefit Trust Fund.
- Communicate with veterans over the phone to provide information and assistance as needed.

50 years ago, Troup 17 made history as the first female cadets in the RCMP



In celebration of the 50th anniversary of women in the RCMP, Veteran Lucie Dubois reflects on her career and encourages other women to join law enforcement. Read this Q&A with the Second Vice-President of the New Brunswick Veterans' Association to learn more about her journey.

As a young girl growing up in Lévis, Québec, what inspired you to become a police officer?

My adventurous nature, love for challenges, and passion for helping and defending the vulnerable inspired me to become a police officer. Fairness and justice were important values to me, and I wanted to serve and protect others.

When did you join the RCMP?

I joined the RCMP on April 5, 1988. As a unilingual francophone, I underwent English language training in Ottawa for four months before attending the RCMP Basic Training at

Depot in August 1988. I graduated from Troop 8, an all-women troop, on March 6, 1989, and my first posting was in Summerside, PEI.

During your career, what were some of the different roles you held, and what would you say was the most rewarding part of your career?

Throughout my career, I have served in various roles, including general duties and highway patrol officer, supervisor, federal enforcement officer, boat operator, and OCC Manager. In 2011, I was commissioned as the Executive Officer to the J Division Commanding Officer. I later became the provincial Officer in Charge of Crime Reduction and served in Haiti for the United Nations and as the Canadian Contingent Commander. Upon my return, I was posted to West District, where I held positions as the Officer in Charge of Operations and District Commander. I also served as a Critical Incident Commander from 2014 until my retirement in May 2020. Following my retirement, I had the privilege of working with New Brunswick Justice and Public Safety for over three years.

The most rewarding part of my career has been the diverse experiences and opportunities it has offered. I am grateful for the mentorship and support I received from role models throughout my journey. Each posting, community, and position I held contributed to my growth and learning. My time in Haiti working with the Haitian National Police was particularly special, as it taught me the true meaning of resilience.

Throughout my career, I have always upheld the principle of giving my best in every endeavor, driven by personal satisfaction rather than external recognition. My family, especially my husband and two daughters, has been my pillar of strength, providing unwavering support. We have instilled the value of resilience in our family, nurturing our daughters to become strong and resilient individuals from a young age.

What qualities do you believe make a good police officer?

A good police officer should be caring, compassionate, passionate about their work, and able to remain calm under pressure. They must also work effectively with their team and be willing to seek help when needed. As a role model for the community, officers should be mindful of their actions and the influence they have on others. It is crucial to uphold the values represented by the uniform they wear.

As a retired law enforcement officer, what advice do you have for women interested in pursuing a career in this field?

My advice is simple: go for it! Surround yourself with supportive and inspiring individuals, seek out challenges that will keep you motivated, and always treat others with kindness and respect. Remember to support your colleagues, share your knowledge and experience, and most importantly, have FUN!

Since Troup 17, the RCMP has made a tremendous amount of progress in creating a diverse and inclusive workforce. Veteran Lucie Dubois encourages those interested in a rewarding career to explore the various opportunities available in the RCMP.

March was Fraud Prevention Month, but scammers can strike at any time!

This year marked the 20th anniversary of Fraud Prevention Month with the theme "20 years of fighting fraud: From then to now "

While many solicitation methods used by fraudsters today existed 20 years ago, their tactics have evolved. Some of the top methods include:

- 1. **Telephone**: The telephone remains a top method for fraudsters based on reports received in 2023.
- 2. **Cyber-enabled fraud (Email, internet, social media, and text messages):** Fraudsters now utilize social media platforms to target victims through fraudulent ads, compromised accounts, and bots to collect personal information.
- 3. Mail: Fraudulent mail can include fake inheritance or prize letters that require payments for fees or insurance.
- 4. **Door-to-door or in-person**: Fraud initiated in person is similar to 20 years ago, with fraudulent contractors offering services with little value or using high-pressure sales tactics for home improvement services.

The RCMP in New Brunswick recently issued a warning about a financial fraud scheme in the province. Scammers are posing as police officers and contacting victims, claiming that a family member is in custody and demanding money for their release. This scam primarily targets seniors who do not have internet access.

To protect yourself and your family from fraud, remain vigilant. Stay informed about current scams by visiting the <u>Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre</u> and sharing this information with others.




- April 14 to 20 is National Volunteer Week.


